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ATLANTA SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA BEGINS THE BEETHOVEN PROJECT

ATLANTA – On January 23, the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra, led by Music Director Nathalie Stutzman, kicks off The Beethoven Project. This epic, year-long endeavor will shed new light on classical music's most well-known composer through performance of all nine of his symphonies, his Triple Concerto, and the dramatic *Missa solemnis*.

"For any orchestra in the world, a Beethoven cycle is a Himalaya," said Stutzmann. "I think it's incredibly exciting for us, but also for the audience, because it's rare to be able to hear the full symphony cycle plus the Triple Concerto plus the *Missa solemnis*."

Under Stutzmann's direction, The Beethoven Project promises to be a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to hear her interpretation of these masterworks with the GRAMMY® Award-winning Atlanta Symphony Orchestra and Chorus.

"She really tries to access that initial germ of musical intent," said Jennifer Barlament, ASO Executive Director. "I think people will be surprised, because it'll feel like they're hearing some of those pieces for the first time, even if they've heard them a million times."

"It's my passion to take these pieces and start from scratch," said Stutzmann. "Just pick up the score and read it with laser eyes and try to understand how it is shaped, so that I have a clear vision from the first note to the last. After all this work, the vision of the score is getting into my soul."

This Spring, the Orchestra performs Beethoven's first 8 symphonies, with a performance of the revolutionary Ninth Symphony in the Fall. The powerful Atlanta Symphony Orchestra Chorus joins the orchestra for the *Missa Solemnis* and Ninth Symphony this Spring.

Music Director Nathalie Stutzmann kicks off the first concert of the Beethoven Project starting with the First Symphony. We meet the composer as he enters a more public phase of his career, venturing into the concert hall with a symphony that's already bending the rules with this piquant production. By the Third Symphony, he's confident in a vision that would usher in the Romantic age. The Third Symphony subtitled "Eroica"—heroic—is a revelation and a revolution. Music will never be the same.

Music Director Nathalie Stutzmann and your orchestra show opposite sides of Beethoven: the tempest and the humorist. It's hard to argue with the enduring popularity of the stormy Fifth Symphony; it grabs you by the collar and keeps you riveted from start to finish. But the same composer, that scowling genius portrayed in 19th-century paintings, imbued his Second Symphony with genial wit and good cheer. Savor the lesser-known Second Symphony side by side with the rocket-fueled Fifth.

Music Director Nathalie Stutzmann continues the Beethoven Project with the piece that found its way into *The Simpsons* and Walt Disney's 1940 animated classic *Fantasia*. Beethoven's ever-popular "Pastoral" Symphony grows out of the composer's daily walks through an Austrian forest, calling forth rustic folk song through the murmuring textures of a symphony orchestra. Then Maestro Stutzmann conducts a piece that extends Beethoven's norm-shattering gift for invention and impish charm—the jocular Eighth Symphony.

In just over 30 years, Ludwig van Beethoven produced works that shattered norms and became the North Star for generations of composers. This week, Music Director Nathalie Stutzmann leads the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra in the magnificent Seventh, a piece that bristles with bounding exuberance and rustic charm yet shimmers with a kind of unfathomable genius. Hear the Seventh Symphony paired with the electric energy of the Fourth Symphony, a piece that Hector Berlioz admired for its contrasts between a "lively, alert, and joyful" spirit and a "heavenly gentleness."

It's three times the charm when Music Director Nathalie Stutzmann presents Beethoven's Triple Concerto, part of the Beethoven Project. The Beethoven Triple mingles the singing qualities of three solo instruments while showing off the artistry of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra family. Also on the program, the virtuosic ASO takes an Alpine trek with Richard Strauss. The ultimate master of tone painting, Strauss begins the journey before dawn, greeting one of the most spectacular sunrises in music. Then, through the ascent, the Orchestra traverses babbling brooks and Alpine meadows to reach the awe-inspired summit, followed by an apocalyptic thunderstorm. The setting sun conjures a deep sense of satisfaction at the journey's end.

Music Director Nathalie Stutzmann wraps up the Beethoven Project with this singular sacred work, written by Beethoven as he entered the most inward-looking, visionary time in his compositional life. The Atlanta Symphony Orchestra welcomes four acclaimed soloists from the world of opera for this monumental work written as an appeal for peace and in praise of God.
