GUEST ARTISTS INCLUDE RENÉE FLEMING, JOSHUA BELL, AND CARLOS SIMON

ATLANTA – Individual tickets are now on sale for the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra 2023/24 Delta Classical Concert season, led by Music Director Nathalie Stutzmann, described by *The New York Times* as "a conductor who certainly knows how to challenge common wisdom."

During this 79th season for the Grammy® Award-winning Orchestra and its second with Stutzmann at the helm, they will explore many of Stutzmann's signature pieces and choral masterworks like Verdi's Requiem and Bruckner's Te Deum, which feature the powerful ASO Chorus. Highlights of the new season include orchestral masterworks such as *The Planets* by Holst, *The Four Seasons* by Vivaldi, *Rhapsody in Blue* by Gershwin, and Dvořák's New World Symphony.

Numerous superstar guest artists join the ASO this season. This fall Joshua Bell plays the Bruch Violin Concerto and excerpts from *The Elements*, a suite for violin commissioned by the artist. In April, soprano Renée Fleming presents an all-Strauss program that includes Fleming's signature *Four Last Songs* by Strauss. Famed pianist Garrick Ohlsson returns to the ASO in May to play Rachmaninov's Piano Concerto No. 3 with ASO Music Director Laureate Robert Spano on the podium.

There will be a variety of new voices and artists, including debuts by 13 guest artists and six conductors. Several world premieres and a co-commission are planned, including a premiere by Chanda Dancy. Composer Joel Thompson, who was featured in 2022, returns for a joint commission with the New York Philharmonic. Music Director Laureate Robert Spano returns for two commissions by Adam Schoenberg and Jonathan Leshnoff.

In February, the ASO honors Black History Month with an evening curated by Grammy® Awardnominated composer and Atlanta native Carlos Simon, who is known for infusing his work with a powerful social conscience. The evening of spoken word and songs will feature the ASO with guest vocalists, the Glee Clubs of HBCUs Morehouse College and Spelman College, as well as poet and spokenword performer Marc Bamuthi Joseph. The program explores contemporary life in Black America with Simon's *brea(d)th* and *Motherboxx Connection*, as well as Uzee Brown's *We Shall Overcome*.

In October, ASO audiences will experience the majesty of the sarod, a stringed instrument from India. Russian conductor Lidiya Yankovskaya leads a program that begins with *Samaagam*, a concerto for orchestra and sarod by Master of the Sarod himself, Amjad Ali Khan. In addition to composing the piece, Khan will perform with his sons, Ayaan and Amaan Ali Bangash, who studied under their father and are also renowned sarod performers.

It's paired with the composers elegant Violin Concerto, played by talented Czech violinist Josef Špaček. Maestro Stutzmann opens the program with selections from Dvořák's Slavonic Dances which were inspired by Johannes Brahms's own Hungarian Dances and were orchestrated at the request of Dvořák's publisher soon after composition.

He comes to Atlanta to conduct a bassoon concerto by film legend John Williams (*Star Wars*, *Harry Potter*). Ever the visual composer, Williams's Concerto for Bassoon, titled *The Five Sacred Trees*, draws its inspiration from Celtic mythology. For the Concerto, the ASO welcomes an old friend, one-time principal bassoonist Andrew Brady. Parnther opens the concert with a world premiere by the rising-star film composer Chanda Dancy and concludes with the Symphony No. 3 by Arkansas-native Florence Price, who overcame racial and gender barriers to compose works performed by major American orchestras in the 1930s and 40s.

Maestro Nathalie Stutzmann marshals the combined forces of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra and Chorus to perform Bruckner's watershed Symphony No. 9 and *Te Deum*, two epic works cut from the same cloth. The 1885 *Te Deum* is a massive, joyous hymn of praise and thanksgiving to God, written for orchestra, chorus, vocal soloists and Bruckner's own instrument, the organ. The Ninth Symphony is dedicated to "the beloved God," but was tragically incomplete at the composer's death. Nevertheless,

the Ninth, with its three cathedral-like movements, has over an hour's worth of completed music. Although the intended finale is unfinished, the *Te Deum* serves as a satisfying cap on the evening. This performance is part of a two-week celebration of Bruckner.

In the piano world, it's known as the "Rach Three," a moniker that comes with reverence, a quickening of the heart, and a dash of terror. Among the most difficult of all the popular piano concertos, it was written by one of the greatest pianists who ever lived: Sergei Rachmaninov (a composer who, let's be honest, had huge hands). For all its difficulty, the Third is equally charming to the listener. To pull off this feat of artistry and virtuosity, the ASO welcomes one of the best: pianist Garrick Ohlsson. Atlanta Symphony Orchestra Music Director Laureate Robert Spano returns for a two-week residency. The longtime leader of the ASO brings with him an old friend of the Orchestra, Emmy Award-winning composer Adam Schoenberg for the world premiere of his Concerto for Orchestra.

Today, *The Rite of Spring* isn't quite so shocking but delivers a thrilling sound experience in the hands of a great orchestra. This week, ASO Music Director Laureate Robert Spano conducts Stravinsky's masterpiece and welcomes the return of American composer Jonathan Leshnoff for the world premiere of his oratorio *Sacrifice of Isaac*.

They call it the Belle Époque—in the early years of the 20th century, the French capital became a magnet for creatives, including Pablo Picasso, Claude Debussy, Gertrude Stein, Henri Matisse, and Marcel Proust. Steeped in that world, two friends, Igor Stravinsky and Maurice Ravel, combined lush harmonies with scintillating orchestral colors to become giants of modern music. Ravel tapped into his Spanish roots for his lusty and bombastic *Alborada del gracioso*, contrasted here with his delicate nod to the French Baroque. Closing the 2023/24 season, Maestro Stutzmann conducts Stravinsky's watershed ballet, *The Firebird*, a titanic and lustrous dazzler in the hands of the ASO. The program pairs these works with one of the great monuments for solo violin, the Beethoven Violin Concerto featuring the muchanticipated return of the German violin virtuoso Veronika Eberle, who wowed Atlanta audiences in 2018 with her "totally on fire" (ArtsATL) performance of Brahms.
